STAFF FORUM – MENTAL HEALTH

Representatives from United Voice participated in the recent staff forum held on 25-26 September where the main topic centred on mental health and wellbeing.

This discussion and the table workshops were driven by the work being done by the QAS Mental Health Taskforce, which includes United Voice member representatives doing great work to progress support for current and retired staff and their families.

It was encouraging to see participants in this forum discuss this important topic openly and honestly. It was useful for the committee members of the taskforce to hear a broad range of perspectives from staff around the state about possible initiatives to break down the stigma attached to mental health amongst emergency service staff.

What is clear from the various discussions around the

state, and across all emergency services nationally, is that we have come a long way in regards to how staff with mental health illnesses are supported in their recovery and return to work options.

NO EXCUSE FOR ABUSE

This week, United Voice delegate Ginny and local QAS representatives spoke out in the media about three recent sickening attacks on paramedics in the Darling Downs region.

In one incident a paramedic suffered several fractures to his nose and required surgery after he was head-butted by an agitated patient in Highfields.

In another incident a paramedic received facial injuries after being kicked by a patient being attended to in Dalby.

In the third incident a paramedic received blows to his back and flank from the knees of an agitated patient in an ambulance also in Dalby.

These are just some examples of the appalling abuse United Voice members face in the line of duty each and every day - and enough is enough.

Thank you to Ginny for stepping up and speaking out against this vile behaviour, as we continue to campaign against violence.
